

DORMONT LODGE NO. 684 F. & A.M. OF PENNSYLVANIA

The Petition says, "...We the undersigned, being regular Master Masons formerly members of the Lodges mentioned opposite our respective names, and at this time not members of any Lodge, pray for a warrant of Constitution empowering us to meet as a regular Lodge at Dormont, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, to be called ----- Lodge, No. ----- and there to discharge the duties of Free-masonry in a constitutional manner; according to the forms of the Fraternity, and the Constitution, Laws and Regulations of the Grand Lodge..." It was signed by 258 (!) Master Masons and endorsed by 11 additional Master Masons.

"At a meeting of Guyasuta Lodge No. 513 held at Pittsburgh on the 21st day of March A.D. 1916, A.L. 5916, on motion made and seconded, it was Resolved that the above petition be recommended to the favorable consideration of the Right Worshipful Grand Lodge."

"At a meeting of the Grand officers of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania held June 7 A.D. 1916, A.L. 5916, a Warrant was granted for a new Lodge to be held at Dormont, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania." It was signed by Right Worshipful Grand Master Louis A. Watres and the other Grand Lodge officers. The Warrant officers were Oliver Berdell Alcorn , Worshipful Master; Charles Emerson Fawcett, Senior Warden; and John George Gray, Junior Warden. Right Worshipful Senior Grand Warden John S. Sell constituted the Lodge on June 23, 1916.

Allegheny County was created by an act of Assembly on September 24, 1788, from Westmoreland and Washington Counties. The county was named for the Allegheny River. This name is a Delaware Indian word meaning "fair water." It is one of the ten counties in Pennsylvania which bear Native American names. The Native Americans, the English, the French, the English again, Virginia, the United States, and Pennsylvania have in turn governed the region of which Allegheny County is the center.

It had always been contested because of its many large waterways, the most spectacular of which is the "Golden Triangle"-- the confluence of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers, which unite to form the Ohio River. Later, Allegheny County was found to be in the middle of a great natural gas field in addition to the bituminous coal formation in the "Appalachian field," from which, it was noted in 1876, more than 100 million bushels(!) of coal a year were mined.

In 1753, the young Brother George Washington had been sent by Governor of Virginia Robert Dinwiddie to inform the French commandant that the area belonged to the English. It was Washington who recommended that a fort be built at the confluence. Early the next year, under orders from Governor Dinwiddie, the fort was begun, but the French under Sieur Contrecoeur captured it and named it Fort Duquesne. The first reference to "Pitts-Bourg" was made by General Forbes in 1758, the year he reestablished British control. General Stanwix gave the name Fort Pitt to the enlarged Fort Duquesne. The name is in honor of Sir William Pitt, the first Earl of Chatham, who was then, in practice, the head of the British government. He helped ensure that France lost her American possessions to Britain, and later championed the cause of the oppressed colonies before the Revolution. The first town of Pittsburgh grew up around the fort. A second town was laid out in 1765 by Colonel John Campbell, by permission of the Commandant of Fort Pitt. In 1769, the Penns set aside the 5000-acre "Manor of Pittsburgh," and the new Commonwealth began to sell off building lots in 1784.

Coinciding with the end of the Revolutionary War, the availability of these lots gave great impetus to the growth of the new town. In 1786, John Scull and Joseph Hall brought a small wooden "Ramage" press to this town of fewer than 100 houses. On July 29th of that year the *Pittsburgh Gazette*, the first newspaper west of the Alleghenies rolled off that press. The Pittsburgh Academy was also established in the same year. Pittsburgh, with its 400 houses, became a borough in 1794, and a city on March 18, 1816. Major Ebenezer Denny (1761-1822) who had acquitted himself well in

both the Revolution and the War of 1812, was the first mayor of the Allegheny County seat. The Pittsburgh area would soon become known as "The Workshop of the World:" The earliest industries were boat-building, distilling, the usual smithing, weaving, milling, rope and saddle-making. The first glass works was put into operation by James O'Hara and Isaac Craig in 1797; this was the first manufacturing venture in Pittsburgh. The first paper mill west of the Alleghenies was started the same year. By the end of the 19th century, one-fifth of the Nation's pig iron, one-fourth of its steel, one-sixth of its glass, and a large percentage of its prepared food products, cork and aluminum products, electrical equipment, machinery, railroad supplies, petroleum products, and chemicals were produced in the Pittsburgh area.

The pre-eminence of Pittsburgh as an industrial center overshadowed other attributes which have come into their own. Pittsburgh boasts, among many other attractions, Point State Park with its Fort Pitt Museum and 1764 blockhouse; the Historical Society of Western Pennsylvania; the Frick Estate and Art Museum, the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra; the well-preserved 19th-century Monongahela and Duquesne Inclines, still part of the city transportation system; the Carnegie Museums and Science Center; the professional sports teams – the Pittsburgh Steelers, Penguins, and Pirates; as well as the Greater Pittsburgh Masonic Center.

Notable Pittsburghers include Pittsburgh Pirate Brother Johannes Peter Wagner, nicknamed "Honus" and "The Flying Dutchman", who is considered one of the greatest players in the history of major league baseball. Two of his brothers were also in the major leagues; in fact, when his older brother Albert, was being "scouted," the scout saw 18-year-old Honus throwing rocks phenomenal distances outside a coal mine, where they worked, and signed him on the spot. Brother Wagner, a life member of Centennial Lodge No. 544, played every position, but it was finally decided that he was

best at shortstop. Another native son is Michael Keller Ditka, Jr. also known as "Iron Mike Ditka" or "Da Coach," a former National Football League player, television commentator, and coach. Ditka coached the Chicago Bears, and is the only person who helped win two Chicago Bears' NFL championships: as a player in 1963 and head coach in 1985.

The land where Dormont lies belonged to the Delaware and Shawnee tribes. In 1768 the territory was part of the transaction in which Fort Stanwix was purchased from the Six Nations. In following years, Dormont's area was part of Cumberland County, Pitt Township in Bedford County, Penn Township in Washington County, and finally,^[2]

Dormont was originally formed from parts of Scott and Union Townships. It seems to have changed township and even counties as political boundaries were drawn and redrawn. It "arrived" in St. Clair Township, Allegheny County in 1788. The town was incorporated on March 31, 1909 - the first independent municipality in the South Hills of Allegheny County. The first election of Borough officials was held on April 27, 1909. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Dormont,_Pennsylvania. There being a dispute over who was to use the originally proposed name, Mt. Lebanon, the name Dormont is the Anglicized version of the French "mont d'or ("Mountain of Gold"), which was suggested by Gilbert M. Brown, the first burgess of Dormont, because of the beautiful hills on which the town is built. Espenshade, A. Howry. *Pennsylvania Place Names*. With the construction of the streetcar tunnel and the "Liberty Tunnels" (also known as the "**Liberty Tubes**"), a pair of tunnels that allow motorists to travel between the South Hills of Pittsburgh and the city, through Mt. Washington. The tunnels were vital in the expansion of the South Hills suburbs because they provided a direct route to Pittsburgh, eliminating the time-consuming task of navigating around or over Mt. Washington and

its inclines. The tunnels were designed by Amos D. Neeld, who would also supervise the construction of the adjoining Liberty Bridge, which gives travelers a way to cross the Monongahela River after passing through the tunnels.

The President of the United States was (Thomas) Woodrow Wilson; the Vice President was Thomas R. Marshall, the Governor of Pennsylvania was Brother Martin G. Brumbaugh; the Lieutenant Governor- was Frank B. McCain.

The International Migratory Bird Treaty between Canada and U.S. was signed.

The Federal Child Labor Law was enacted.

The U.S. President's flag was adopted.

A transcontinental motorcycle trip, New York City to San Diego, was completed by women.

Acadia National Park (Maine) was the first national park established east of the Mississippi.

The Tournament of Roses football game, first played by Washington State vs. Brown, became an annual event.

The Professional Golfer Association (PGA) was formed in New York City.

World War I was being fought on the European continent and elsewhere. Paris was bombed by German zeppelins for the first time. The U.S. entered to fight on the side of

The Chicago Cubs played their first game at Weeghman Park (Wrigley Field), defeating the Cincinnati Reds 7–6 in 11 innings.

The *Saturday Evening Post* published its first Norman Rockwell cover (*Boy with Baby Carriage*).

The case of *United States v. Forty Barrels and Twenty Kegs of Coca-Cola* was decided. (The Government wanted the caffeine removed from Coca-Cola).

U.S. President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill incorporating the Boy Scouts of America.

This was the summer of shark attacks along the New Jersey Shore resulting in 4 deaths and the survival of one youth who required limb amputation. Peter Benchley was inspired fifty years later to write *Jaws*.

The first 40 hour work week officially began in the Endicott-Johnson factories of Western New York

Republican Jeannette Rankin of Montana became the first woman elected to the U.S. House of Representatives.

Gustave Holst composed *The Planets, Opus 32*.
